Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP)

The NSGP provides federal funding for physical security enhancements and other security related activities to nonprofit organizations at risk of a terrorist attack.

Besides funding, it aims to integrate plans and actions of nonprofit organizations with broader community preparedness efforts.

How can we enhance Facility Security?

- Appoint a Security Team
- Conduct a Facility Security Assessment
- Develop an Emergency/Evacuation Plan
- Organize Training and Education/Awareness activities
- Practice, Practice

Meet with local law enforcement

Review insurance coverage


Appoint a spokesperson

An assessment to identify the threats and vulnerabilities which pose the greatest risk is essential to improving the security of any organization or facility.

Emergency Planning

- Collect important information and keep copies in different locations in the church, and a copy off site
- Post signage for exits
- Identify persons who will help people who need extra assistance
- Designate external reunification locations






Counter-Improvised Explosive Device (C-IED)

Building Awareness

- Understanding Alerts and Alarms

2023 Non-Profit Security Grant

- Total 2023 Federal Funding: \$360 million
- Nationally competitive program
- Maximum subgrant award of \$150,000 per site
- No match requirement
- Period of performance: October 2023 to September 2026
- Types of Eligible Organizations
 - Ideological-based/Spiritual/Religious
 - Educational
 - Medical
 - Other



Funding Priorities

- Enhancing the Protection of Soft Targets/Crowded Places (top priority)
- Planning
- Training and Awareness
- Practical Exercises to assess equipment, planning, and training
- Equipment
- Personnel



Eligibility

Eligible applicants must be:

- Organizations that qualify as 501(c)(3) entities and are exempt from tax under section 501(a)
- Located in the State of West Virginia
- Able to demonstrate, through the application, that they are at risk of a terrorist attack
- An occupant of the facility at the time of application

Eligibility

The following types of entities are not eligible:

- Volunteer Fire Departments
- For-profit hospitals
- For-profit transportation companies
- Community service organizations
- Utility companies
- Homeowners associations
- Labor, agricultural, or horticultural organizations

<u>Unallowable Costs</u>

- Organizational Operating Costs
- General-use expenditures
- Development of risk/ vulnerability assessments
- License Plate Reader (LPR) systems
- Facial Recognition software
- Knox boxes
- Guns/Weapons
- Weapons Training
- Landscaping

- Sexual Predator Screening Database
- Initiatives in which federal agencies are the beneficiary or that enhance federal property
- Hiring of public safety personnel
- Overtime
- Any pre-award costs (including grant writer)
- Proof-of-concept initiatives or initiatives which study technology development
